# Happiness is O-shaped

The data is in: happiness is O-shaped!

In 1938, researchers at Harvard Medical School initiated a study that involved studying a group of participants who were studying at Harvard over the course of their life, from youth to old age. Every year or two, researchers asked the participants about their lifestyles, habits, relationships, work, and happiness. The study has since expanded to include people beyond the initial group of Harvard students and its results have been updated regularly for more than eighty years.

Our sense of happiness peaks in our 20s and tends to decline after the age of 30, eventually bottoming out at about age 50. The good news is that it heads back up again in our 60s.

According to the Harvard study, the single most important trait of happiness in later life is healthy relationships. Robert Waldinger, a psychiatrist at Massachusetts General Hospital and a professor of psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, who currently directs the study, reports ... The surprising finding is that our relationships and how happy we are in our relationships has a powerful influence on our health ... [In fact] well-being can be built – and the best building blocks are good, warm relationships ... The study revealed that more than money or fame, good relationships are what keeps people happy throughout their lives. It is our healthy relational ties that help to delay our physical and mental decline, and they are better predictors of long and happy lives than social class, IQ, or even genes. These findings proved true across the board.

Who knew that Jesus' teaching on loving our neighbours and our enemies might be good for our long-term health?

So, people, if you want to be happy and healthy do the work now and begin to cultivate healthy relationships. Find people with whom you can grow and whom you can count on. In fact, why not give church a try this Sunday? You might be surprised what kind of people you will meet there.



# St Margaret's Church, Cley-next-the-Sea, Norfolk

Cley-next-the-Sea is the village on the North Norfolk coast where my family have had an old house



for the past seventy years. It is separated from the sea by salt marshes, hence its name. In historical times it was an important port, trading wool with the low countries, but in the 1600s, embankments were built by the local landowners and the tides no longer swept up to the village.

St Margaret's is its magnificent, flint-faced church, standing on a rise close to where the harbour was in the middle-ages. It was founded in the fourteenth century, funded by wealthy benefactors, whose crests can be seen in the beautiful south porch. Inside, light pours in through its cinquefoil clerestory windows and its perpendicular style east window. Its nave has five, high, clustered arches flanked by large aisles. The corbels were originally carved and painted with figures of musicians. Some of these are still visible to the roving eye, but most were damaged in the time of the Reformation. The fifteenth century font pictures the Seven Sacraments. The nave has fifteenth century

carved poppy bench ends depicting imaginative creatures, and there are fine brasses set into the floor. The transepts were never finished as originally planned, because of the "Black Death" that engulfed the country, but the remains of the beautiful, decorated tracery in the window of the incomplete south transept still stand.

Today, it is one of the five churches which form the Glaven Valley Benefice and share services. St Margaret's holds a range of evening services monthly: Café Church, Taize services, a meditative service, and a mid-week communion; the main Sunday morning services are held in the neighbouring Blakeney Church.

We went to a Café Church, which was well attended and thoughtfully planned. We also went to a wonderful concert there, given by the English Chamber Orchestra with the guitarist, Craig Ogden. This was a concert organised by "Music in Country Churches", of which Prince Charles is patron. Just before the due beginning, it was announced that there would be a fifteen-minute delay for the arrival of a special visitor, Prince Charles, and please would we all stand to greet him! He walked past us, only a metre distant and with minimum fuss.
