Christmas does not just happen. Someone has to make it. According to the Gospels, even God needed help to pull the first one together. There are lots of reasons to be grateful at Christmas, not least for those who make such selfless and gigantic efforts to "make Christmas" for us all. That is partly why I love the poem *The Queens came late*.

I love the poem because, without losing the wonder of Christmas, it manages to by-pass the sentimental and capture the practical aspects of that first Christmas, and indeed of every Christmas since. Practicalities which, if men are honest, are usually overseen and taken care of by the women in their lives. The poem reminds us to pause this Christmas, to step back, to look around, and give thanks for and to those people in our lives who do so much to "make Christmas" a joyous occasion and a lasting memory for all of us.

The Queens came late
but the Queens were there
With gifts in their hands and crowns in their hair.
They'd come, these three, like the Kings, from afar,
Following, yes, that guiding star.

Advent garden ceremony

You are invited to come and enjoy the Carlops Advent Garden ceremony, which returns on Sunday 4 December 2022; gather in the church at 3.45pm for a 4pm start. Technically, this is a children's event, but adults are welcome, and don't need to be accompanied by a child!

With Gerda Stevenson leading the ceremony, we will make a magical indoor garden with a spiral path of moss, with a mound in the centre, holding a large candle. As we sing carols, children will walk the paths in the moss and light their own candles, which they carry in lovely red cored apples, then choose a place in the garden to plant them.

The ceremony will last for about an hour. There will be Christmas biscuits for the children to enjoy with juice after the ceremony, while Gerda reads a Christmas story; mulled wine for the adults.

Each child should bring her/his own apple, with a candle in its cored centre, so that the apple becomes a candle-holder. An ordinary white kitchen candle is ideal. Red apples look lovely in the green moss. Finally, thinking of candles at ground level, it would be best to avoid flouncy, flowing clothes.

New Linkage website

The cross-linkage communications group has been working on a website to represent the whole linkage. It is intended to provide the linkage with a "web presence", and to support and extend the reach of individual church websites, which will continue to be maintained. The General Kirk Session approved early proposals in autumn and asked that they be developed to a finished product and made public on the internet. This has now been done.

The new year issue of the Newsletter will carry more information (your editor reckons that the runup to Christmas is not a wise time to float new products if one expects them to receive informed attention!), but readers may care to make an early visit to the site www.westtweeddale.org.uk.

We confirm that the new site is not intended to replace either the Carlops Church website, or this *Newsletter*. Both will continue alongside the linkage site, and we hope they will continue to act as a prime source of Carlops-related information.

Presbytery plan, 2023-27

Regular readers will know that the responsibilities and activities of the Presbytery of Melrose and Peebles will be taken over by a new, larger Presbytery of Lothian and Borders from January 2023.

One of the final acts of Melrose and Peebles Presbytery has been to develop a *Mission plan* for the period 2023-27, setting out its objectives and hopes, and explaining how it believes the allocation of human resources and buildings may best be managed for that period. The plan, approved by

Presbytery at its meeting on Wednesday 16 November 2022, will be passed to the new Presbytery and will be reviewed annually.

The plan was prepared in the context of the Church of Scotland's formally agreed needs to manage with fewer ministers and to reduce the number of buildings that it maintains. Carlops Session Clerk confirms that the approved plan implies no threat to the immediate future of Carlops Church.

Winter Warmers: a linkage-wide initiative



Winter Warmers is a cross-linkage project of the West Tweeddale parishes to respond to the current economic and fuel problems and to offer help and support to everyone in our communities.

Winter warmers is signposting "warm events" taking place across the six parishes: events open to everyone; where people can be sure of a welcome, refreshments like a cup of tea or coffee, or a bowl of soup; served in a warm, safe environment; and a chance to meet friends and neighbours to talk and exchange news. Some of these events may be familiar already, but Winter warmers gives them a higher profile and advertises them more widely.

A monthly timetable of the winter warmer events will be posted around the parishes (in Carlops, see the church's outside notice board) and the events will be listed in this *Newsletter*, on the Carlops Church website www.carlopschurch.org and on the new, West Tweeddale linkage website; see article above, and visit it at www.westtweeddale.org.uk.

The project stems from a proposal from Fiona Burnet to the General Kirk Session that the linkage churches should take simple, practical steps to ensure that people are kept aware of support available, including the several social activities organised to promote regular contact with friends and neighbours. Fiona envisaged especially, a focus on staying warm and having company during the coming months; both of these will help people through the current cost-of-living difficulties. Fiona's proposed initiative was welcomed warmly, with several people offering to take part.

Subsequently, a cross-linkage group has been working to publicise existing events and arrange some new ones. These too will aim to keep people warm and offer company. Some will include practical sessions, providing suggestions about cost-saving and helping to enhance everyday skills. Look out for posters and articles advertising these soon.

This is not overtly "Christmassy" (whatever that means today) but seems appropriate given events of the past 30+ months. Guy Walters read this poem during Carlops' remembrance service on 13 November 2022. The last verse will be too imperial for 2022's taste, and there's a tendency to decry "stiff upper lip" these days; perhaps that is part-justified; but perhaps too, the pendulum has swung too far and we could do well to redress the psychological balance.

The poet, Geoffrey Anketell Studdert Kennedy (1883-1929) was an Anglican priest, nicknamed "Woodbine Willie" during World War I for giving cigarettes, as well as spiritual aid, to the soldiers he met. He was awarded the Military Cross "for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty".

When there ain't no gal to kiss you, And the postman seems to miss you, And the fags have skipped an issue ... Carry on.

When ye've got an empty belly, And the bulley's rotten smelly, And you're shivering like a jelly ... Carry on.
