Light - and light

Rev Dr Foley's diary makes him unable to write for the linkage newsletters this month, so Colin Herd has offered this article. Readers will recall that, in addition to leading services at Carlops from time to time, Colin edits the newsletter of St Andrew's Church West Linton. Thanks Colin.

The article's title, Light – and light, is my invention.

June is the month of light, the month of the summer solstice, when millions of people in northernmost Europe stay out late to enjoy the sight of the midnight sun. To have light and glory where there is usually darkness is something we celebrate, we welcome.

Jesus said: "I am the light of the world" (John 8:12 and John 9:5). He wasn't comparing himself to the summer solstice, but teaching at a Jewish occasion which celebrated light every bit as much – the Feast of Tabernacles (John 7:14) – a celebration, not only of God's provision of water, but also of the light of God's presence with the Israelites in the wilderness.

During the Feast of Tabernacles there was a joyful celebration. The priests would light four huge lamps in the Court of Women. The flames would reach as high as the temple walls and would provide a light that could be seen all throughout Jerusalem. Men of deep piety would dance throughout the night for the entire week of celebrating. A choir, accompanied by an orchestra of instruments, would sing psalms like Psalm 27, which declares "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

At the height of this grand celebration, the Jesus had the temerity to stand and say that he was the light that was foreshadowed by the light for the Israelites in the wilderness. The Jewish leaders were furious, and they tried to stone him to death. Jesus did not fight back. He simply illustrated his claim to be the light of the world by giving sight to a man born blind (John 9:5).

In the twenty centuries since then, the word of God, when it is proclaimed, has drawn people out of the darkness and into the light of Jesus. The word is, as the psalmist said, "a lamp to my feet and a light for my path" (*Psalm 119:105*). David said, "In your light we see light" (*Psalm 36:9*). Today, by the light of the word of God, we can see Jesus as he is: truly the light of the world.

A-I or D-I-Y?

Artificial intelligence (AI) is receiving close attention, not just from "the meeja", but in serious academic, business and political circles too. This true story may instruct and amuse.

Richard ---- has serviced, trouble-shot and generally looked after our computers for nearly twenty years now. We'd be lost without him. If there's a problem, you call Richard, he looks at the PC via remote access software, and he fixes it. 36 hours is a long problem-to-fix time; twelve hours is typical. Two weeks ago, I received Richard's usual email about healthchecks, inviting me to book a time when our PCs would be free for him to work on. Or I thought it was his usual email, until I read the last paragraph. "You might like to know that, as there's so much in the news about artificial intelligence right now, I got ChatGPT (AI software) to write this message for me. Just for fun. It's been interesting. Tell me what you think."

I read the message again, carefully this time. It got Richard's message across and said all I needed to know: healthcheck time coming up; earliest and latest dates for this round of healthchecks; invitation to book a time that suited me; click here to start the booking process; any issues you want to mention up-front. So far, so good. It communicated what it needed to communicate.

But it was much longer than Richard's usual message, and about twice as long as it needed to be.
