Empty space, or is it?

One of the things I first things I noticed when we moved to the countryside was the sky. In the countryside, the sky manages to be everywhere. It soars over the tallest hills and at the same time fills the deepest valleys. In my back garden on a clear winter's night, the sky seems even more present. It appears at its most exhibitionist, dressed up in sparkling stars.

Looking at the sky on a clear day or night, I am always struck by how much space there is. It sometimes seems as though space is the most basic ingredient in the universe. It is everywhere, even at subatomic levels, where we would expect things to be very dense and compact, there is space. It seems that even within atoms, there is space between particles. In fact, a cursory glance at an atom under a microscope suggests that 99.9 per-cent of an atom is empty! There may be less of us than we think. (I wish somebody would inform my weighing scales.)

But then along came scientists like Newton, Faraday, Einstein and others, who helped us to see that the space in our universe is not empty, but filled with invisible fields: fields like gravity. These fields, although invisible, act like non-material influences across great distances. We cannot see these fields, but we can observe their influence and impact. Michael Talbot in his book Beyond Quantum says:

Although we know a great deal about how fields affect the world as we perceive it, the truth is no one really knows what a field actually is. The closest we can come to describing what they are is to say that they spatial structures in the fabric of space itself.

I cannot help but wonder if Nicodemus felt the same sense of puzzlement and wonder during his conversation with Jesus in John's Gospel, chapter three, when Jesus tried to illustrate the dynamics of living one's life with God. So much of what we learn and discover about the laws that govern our existence have their beginnings in taking a step of faith. How much of our ignorance of God is down to our unwillingness to take that step of faith? As the cultural critic H L Mencken put it ...

Penetrating so many secrets, we cease to believe in the unknowable.
But there it sits nevertheless, calmly licking its chops.

Social events problem? Please let us know

It's still early in Carlops Church's "social events season" – the regular Coffee morning, soup lunches and Cuppa and company event that we run. Most of them restart during September and run through till April, then break for the summer (Why? Don't know!).

But this year looks like it may be different from previous years, and we'd like to know from you if there's' some reason that we could deal with. Numbers are quite a way down on last "season" ...

- The two *Soup lunches* this year so far have attracted about 12-15 people, compared to last year's 25-30.
- Cuppa and company has dropped from around 15 most Thursdays, to about 8-10.
- Coffee drop-in on the last Saturday of the month has fewer supporters too.

We don't miss any familiar faces in particular; there are just fewer of them at any event. We haven't changed what the events are about. There are no formalities about attending; just turn up. And we haven't changed how we publicise them. So ...?

New Forward plan awaiting approval

Julie Gamble and Rennie McElroy have completed their task of revising Carlops Church's *Forward plan*. A first draft reflecting all comment received from supporters, and including Julie's and Rennie's analysis of the 2016 edition in the light of Carlops Church's actual performance, was discussed informally with the Church's principal office-bearers early in October. Following final "tweaks" (technical term in editing!), a final draft has been prepared and awaits approval before being published and distributed to our supporters throughout the community.

Recycling Medicinal Blister Packs

Several people have expressed interest in the prospect of recycling empty medicinal blister packs. The potential demand for this is huge: since our informal conversations about it started in Carlops a few months ago, the small number of people involved have given me enough empty packs to fill four large bin bags! I've done some research and have a partial answer!

Local authorities

Most UK local authorities don't accept blister packs in household recycling bins. They treat them as general domestic waste, so they go to landfill or are incinerated.

Superdrug with Terracycle*

Blister packs may be recycled via some Superdrug *pharmacies* (but not Superdrug drug stores!). This stems from a partnership between Superdrug and a company called Terracycle (see note below), which collects business and industrial specialist waste as a commercial venture. The blister packs are a modest proportion of Superdrug's total pharmacy waste. Superdrug outlets in Selkirk and Inverness offer this recycling service, but I haven't yet traced an option nearer Carlops.

Aldi with Terracycle*

Terracycle operates a similar arrangement with Aldi, whereby domestic participants can mail in limited numbers of blister packs – maximum of sixty items per month. I am mailing my first two bags this week as a "road test" and will let you know how I get on. The limit on quantity makes this option less than ideal, but it is a start, and it seems easy to do ...

- I. Register as a collector
- 2. Pack your empty blister packs in a C4 size envelope
- 3. Download a mailing label from Aldi's website
- 4. Put the sealed envelope in any mailbox as freepost

I will also keep searching for a recycling option that does not impose limits on quantity and will report when or if I find something suitable. Anyone who knows of other solutions, please contact me. And meanwhile – keep taking the tablets!

A little local (film) busy-ness - update

We understand that arrangements for a film company to use Carlops village hall for an extended period will go ahead, unless there is a major, late hiccup at the film company end. Operational issues mean that the timetable has slipped a little, but the hall's negotiators are awaiting final documents for formal agreement and signature as this is written on 26 October 2023.

^{*} **Terracycle** https://www.terracycle.com/en-GB/ is a company that offers free-at-point-of-use recycling programmes (funded by brands, retailers and manufacturers) which can help you to recycle specialist items.

Events normally scheduled in the church will not be affected by these arrangements, but the church will be used for several activities that would normally take place in the hall during the periods when the latter is occupied by the film company.

What follows is an outline of the current state of play. Details my well change as the hire progresses. Check www.carlopschurch.org, or www.carlops.net and local WhatsApp postings for updates.

It is currently planned that the company's use of the hall will cover two periods: 27 November – 21 December 2023; and 8 January – I March 2024. The intervening gap means that the hall is available to the community for the traditional Christmas and New Year celebratory events. In addition, the hall representatives have negotiated that the hall will be available to Carlops community for certain scheduled events on a few occasions on dates that technically fall within the hire periods. For example, in the hall ...

- 26 November Wandering Willie's Tale
- 9 December The Two Moronnies
- 15 December Pentland Film Society
- 16 December Children's Christmas Party
- 22 December Linton Singers' Carol Concert
- 31 December Hogmanay Ceilidh

From January 2024, the film company expects to be under more time pressure, so the community may not have such occasional use of the hall during the second hire period, 8 January – I March, though we understand that Carlops Burns' supper will be held in the hall on 26 January.

Alexander McCall Smith and Anna Marshall "in conversation"

Christian Aid update

I have recently received an update from Christian Aid Scotland concerning our donation of £1118.25, collected during Christiaan Aid in May.

The money has helped women like Jen Bishop in Malawi to plant better seeds and secure fair prices for her crops, away from the hands of dishonest middlemen. You only need to look to Ester Saizi, another farmer in Malawi, to see the lasting impact gifts like ours can have. Like Jen, Esther struggled to obtain fair prices and couldn't store her crops safely from storms and floods. But when she joined a pigeon pea programme run by a CA partner organization, and started to sell as part of a cooperative, she was able to earn much more — it provided her with financial stability.

Esther is doing amazing things for her family with her pigeon peas. She bought tools for her daughter Ziwone to use in her carpentry business and pays for her daughter Rashida's school costs. She is now able to store her pigeon peas safely in a warehouse. What a transformation!

Nuclear issues and climate change

No-one should be in any doubt that we are facing a climate and biodiversity crisis which, together, pose genuine existential threats to humanity. Yet we cannot wait for governments to act. While they may occasionally make the right noises, manifesto commitments around the environment are not yet a core vote winner. We have seen this week [week beginning 25 September 2023] how the UK government has completely rolled back on its green policies. What example does this set to the young who are the ones who will outlive us and have to deal with the broken world?

I have been a member of Scottish CND since I was a teenager, believing passionately that the world must get rid of these obscene weapons. We all know the devasting impact of Hiroshima, but we have our own sites at Faslane and Coulport, only a short distance from our biggest city, Glasgow. The destruction would be wide-spread. But were you aware that the US has delivered new fighter jets to Lakenheath in Suffolk and other European NATO bases. These jets are able to launch satellite guided nuclear bombs, the most dangerous weapons in the nuclear arsenal as they are small and targeted. In reality, the radioactive fallout means that they are totally indiscriminate, killing and poisoning people for miles around.

Militarism fuels the Climate Crisis

- Did you know that Military emissions are exempt from global mandatory reporting and reduction targets?
- Global military carbon emissions account for 5.5% of total global emissions, exceeding the value of civilian aviation
- The UK spends over 7 times more on its military than on reaching the Net Zero targets.

92 countries have now signed the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons. This is good progress for a treaty that was only adopted six years ago. In Carlops, we have been part of the national bell-ringing marking our support.

What can we do? Join Scottish CND. Write to your MP. Stand with "Women in Black" every Saturday I-2 in Edinburgh. Come to the Festival of Survival in Glasgow on 4th November THE FESTIVAL FOR SURVIVAL, where we will be discussing ideas to save the world.
