From the General Kirk Session

Thursday 9 November 2023

Rev Dr Tony Foley convened the General Kirk Session in Carlops Church and over Zoom.

Style and pattern of future meetings

Rev Dr Foley set out his vision for a GKS that should meet more regularly and might engage members in occasional social events, as well as business meetings. This could help members get to know each other better. Rev Dr Foley announced the dates for four GKS meetings in 2024: 22 February, 23 May, 5 September, I4 November. These dates are on the website at <u>Business meetings</u> - <u>Carlops church</u>. He spoke too, about how the individual Kirk Sessions might work, wondering if it might help to separate operational business from pastoral and spiritual matters.

Linkage strategic plan?

Steven Whalley proposed a cross-linkage working group to develop a plan to "grow the church" throughout the linkage: increase community-wide awareness of church activities; identify new activities that might be offered; consider how services might evolve to attract more, younger people. Discussion favoured the proposal: at least one linkage church has worked with a forward plan since 2007 and finds it valuable; any new plan will need to sit comfortably with such existing plans; the proposed working group should consult widely across the linkage communities and not restrict itself to input from "Sunday congregations". GKS approved the proposal and asked Steven to invite people from across the linkage to form the working group. GKS looks forward to receiving the group's proposals in due course.

Presbytery

Murray Campbell and Isobel Hunter reported on Presbytery business. The Presbytery plan has been formally approved at last; implementation is progressing. The approval process had been "difficult" and unsatisfactory; it should be improved before the next edition of the plan is due. Presbytery needs more people to serve as interim moderators and invites volunteers; people who are not ordained ministers are eligible for this role; training will be provided. Anyone interested, talk to Murray Campbell in the first instance.

Communication; good practice

Neil Robinson introduced proposals from the linkage Communication group outlining good practice for adoption across the linkage. It was well received and it is hoped that everyone, and particularly office-bearers, will put its recommendations into practice. Read the paper at Communications Strategy.pdf (westtweeddale.org.uk).

Safeguarding and whistle-blowing

Pat Graham introduced draft policies on safeguarding and whistle-blowing, noting that the Church of Scotland advises all Kirk Sessions to adopt these (or similar policies). GKS noted these and asked individual Kirk Sessions to consider them and make decisions.

Local Church Review

Murray Campbell reminded GKS of the Local Church Review that Presbytery will undertake soon. A detailed timetable should be available later, but it is expected that the review team's meeting(s) with congregation members will take place on 27 January 2024, in Skirling.

Swansong

December 2023: my last issue as editor of this *Newsletter*. Volume 17, Number 12 – that means *Column* 204; and the 204th set of all the other articles. That's a lot of writing, inviting, nudging, appealing, imagining, composing, hair-pulling, and finally selecting.

Sometimes, it's been easy – a fair group of articles waiting to be published – just a matter of deciding the order in which to release them. Is item A more important than B? Where does C fit best? Is D still relevant, or too dated? Will author X be miffed if I hold this piece over till next month? At other times, the drawer has been empty, and I've sought help. Please write something, anything – but do it now! You've all seen these pleas; many of you have answered them – thank you. Sometimes, frantic head-scratching as copy date approaches. What should I write about? What do I say about issue Y? Inspiration needed, Rennie!

The *Column* is always both a test and a bit of fun. Thank you everyone who has helped make it so by writing over the years, with a special nod to regular columnists. Many *Columns* stand the test of time and still make enjoyable and thought-provoking reading long after publication.

Minister's think-piece: thank you, Bob, Calum, Finlay, Linda, Malcolm, Nancy, Rachel, Stewart, Tom, Tony. Readers expect you to be on page two and you've kept faith with them.

Then the *news items* themselves. More complexity to decisions here. What to say? The gamut from boom to bust; from a surfeit of material, to little or none. Some issues full of meat; others slim pickings. But being a *Carlops* newsletter has helped: there's always something going on. How to say it? That's a harder question. Find the balance between the facts, and one's own instinctive reaction, and the other shades of opinion one might expect to exist out there. Then there's confidentiality. May one say X? Can'Y be reported? I've found that openness, sticking to fact, reporting controversy but not encouraging it, and explaining what is *not* included in a report, offer a collective solution.

I've been a fortunate editor. Freedom to choose and to publish has always been extended to me. No one has ever said "Write this" or Don't mention that". There have been no turf wars and I've never had to play a "freedom of the press" card. It's the readers' church; they have a right to know: tell them, but tell them straight; don't speculate; don't sensationalise. No permissions or approvals sought or needed. With that, of course, comes the obligation to act responsibly, with scrupulous regard for both the readers' right to know, and Carlops Church's right to a fair accounting.

In seventeen years, only one conflict. I21 in self-focussed wisdom decided that information which it caused to be announced at public worship should not be relayed to other supporters. This editor disagreed and published the plainest account of the facts as announced, specifying also what was not and could not be known accurately. Minor uproar in some quarters, but the upshot was that Carlops community alone did not become a hot-bed of rumour.

I tender my grateful thanks to those who have extended such scope and trust to me.

The Newsletter and the Column have played many roles: inform, describe, reflect, opine, provoke, poke gentle fun. It couldn't happen without those readers who also wrote, and the organisers and decision-makers who made things happen – apparently just for me to report upon! And it couldn't happen without all those people (You!) who made the whole thing worthwhile by reading the product.

It is sad, and a relief, and a pleasure to pass the editorial pen (keyboard?) to Julie Gamble. I know she will handle it well and I look forward to reading her work. I know you will support her, but I leave you with this plea. When Julie asks for comment and opinion, don't hold back, but write, or phone, or speak to her. She really does want to hear from you. Editors need to know what readers think. Help her to keep you informed.

My very welcome last task as editor is to express special thanks to Mary. She has proof-read all 204 issues, commented on umpteen drafts, and advised countless times about what an editor wiser than me might publish – and how he might phrase what he publishes!

Thank you everyone, for your support, loyalty and forbearance. My last issue as editor. My last issue as author? Don't know. Not my decision!
