From Carlops Kirk Session Tuesday 28 November 2023

Rev Dr Tony Foley convened Carlops Kirk Session. Julie Gamble attended her first meeting as a member and was warmly welcomed by the Minister and all members.

Forward Plan

Julie Gamble and Rennie McElroy presented a revised *Forward Plan*. Session members discussed it, then approved it for implementation and publication. Julie and Rennie were thanked and congratulated on their work. More information about the *Forward Plan* is in the article later in this issue.

Finance matters

Mary McElroy presented a summary budget report for the year 2023 to date. Despite some new expenditure this year (principally to fund the widely welcomed additional social events in the church), she forecast that the likely out-turn for the whole year would be sound.

Session approved Mary's proposal to install a digital giving facility. This will enable people to donate by card to Carlops Church and the charities we support, and to pay for items purchased, eg notecards, Fair Trade goods. The necessary equipment and software is expected to be installed in the first months of 2024. Mary confirmed that the system will operate alongside existing models of donating. Session welcomed the proposal.

Mary McElroy informed the Kirk Session formally of her intention to resign the role of Church Treasurer during 2024, and from 31 December 2024 at the latest. Session noted this with regret and thanked Mary for her contribution.

Safeguarding, data protection and privacy policies

Murray Campbell reported that almost all Session members have completed Presbytery's safeguarding training. He criticised the training provided and has provided feedback to organisers which may help them improve it. Session members agreed with his view; the present programme focuses almost entirely on safeguarding panels and their processes; it fails to provide useful advice about personal conduct and danger signals (of possible abuse) to those attempting to work within congregations.

Session members might undertake a "basic disclosure" process as part of our safeguarding

procedures; further information will be sought. Patsy Campbell agreed to represent Carlops Church on the linkage safeguarding panel led by Pat Graham of St Andrews Church.

Jule Gamble agreed to manage Carlops Church's data protection, data privacy and GDPR practices and to serve as our representative in this respect.

Property

Gill Gold reported that the building is in good order. Minor but essential repairs to the front door have been carried out. The new blinds on the south windows are working as expected. A Fire inspection and a quinquennial electrical inspection are due during 2024.

Eco Group

Anna Woolverton's written report included: successful soup lunches, coffee morning etc; a seminar contributed to Presbytery's conference in Jedburgh in September by a Carlops team; encouraging progress in the developing community garden in the Rock Field. Anna's report also proposed some 2024 activities and suggested a meeting of the Eco Group in January to take these forward. Session welcomed the report and looks forward to future activity.

Presbytery

Murray Campbell reported, noting that as our still-new Presbytery established itself fully, more information and funding services may become available to individual churches; he will keep Session informed. Murray also confirmed that our linkage's Presbytery-led Local Church Review is scheduled for late January 2024. The review team are planning to hold meetings in Skirling on Saturday 27 January 2024, at which they will have opportunity to meet congregation members.

The Column



The Scrape

Perhaps on the way towards Edinburgh you've noticed the shallow water that lies in the field just north-west of the A702 at Nine Mile Burn. It's not always there, it vanishes more often than it used to, even in my short time in the area.

Waiting for the bus there, or coming slowly out on to the main road, I've had small windows to see the variety of bird life using this hangout.

Lapwings are in decline all over the country, but at the scrape you can sometimes see dozens. They wheel above it, sometimes right over the busy road. At dusk they settle in the fields around Marfield Farm, the sound, like old radios being tuned in, travelling far across the flat landscape.

Greylag geese are frequent visitors. Teal, shelduck, curlew, tufted duck, goosander, mallard of course, the odd swan, some gulls, oystercatchers and small waders too far away to identify. Imagine how many others I haven't observed.

When you see various birds thriving around this marshy pool it can be difficult to watch it slowly dry up to a cracked desert and stay like that for weeks, as it has done these past 2 summers. What of the nesting waders, are their nests abandoned? It seems so. The swallows and martins, using the pool edge to gather mud and skimming its surface for food, fly further afield. The birds have chosen this spot, so it must have many of the attributes they seek. But without the water, the nymphs, the insects the bog plants, there is no home here.

While this struggle in nature is uncomfortable to see, it's a reminder of our changing climate and the challenge of taking action to reverse the slide. We can't create a wetland in our back gardens, but we can make small changes to help nature. Anything you can do would help.

This little scrape, a hive of activity at times, is so oddly placed by the A road but that just sums up how nature will take any presented opportunity to thrive.
