'Whatabouterism'

In 2013, the then future Prime Minister of the UK, Boris Johnson wrote an article, describing what he called "dead cat" strategy politics. Or what I have termed 'Whatabouterism'. Imagine for a moment a family heatedly engaged in some hoary familial argument. When, in walks granddad and slams a mangy and very dead cat on the table. In that moment, the argument is forgotten. The dead cat is all the family is talking about. Johnson's somewhat cynical point was that if you present the public with an outrageous, ridiculous, and scandalous piece of news, they completely forget about the much more pertinent issue that needs their attention. It is a tactic political media strategists and spin doctors seek to use almost every day — it's when they shout "Oh, look over there!" - 'What about that!' This insipient form of 'Whatabouterism' is the plague of our time. It is the stuff that Social Media and our 24/7 news media thrives on.

In 1990, the Nobel Prize winner and Pulitzer Prize Saul Bellow gave a lecture at Oxford University titled "The Distracted Public." In his talk, Bellow lamented what he called the looming "moronic inferno" that was being fuelled by our contemporary addiction to distraction, which if left unchecked would one day become, "the apocalypse of our times." He called on artists and writers everywhere to raise their voices and use their talents to counter this "massive and worldwide hostile condition" that besetting humanity.

C.S. Lewis struck a similar note in a sermon he preached during the Second World War speaking to what he called the 'The task of our times,' counselled his listeners: "Never, in peace or war, commit your virtue or your happiness to the future. Happy work is best done by the person who takes their long-term plans somewhat lightly... The present is the only time in which any duty can be done, or any grace received."

The 'Whatabouterism,' of popular media that is constantly trying to invade our daily lives is emotionally akin to finding ourselves out at sea caught in the thrall of neverending squalls. Perhaps that is what Jesus was trying to warn us about when he counselled us to: 'Give your entire attention to what God is doing right now, and don't get worked up about what may or may not happen tomorrow. God will help you deal with whatever hard things come up when the time comes.' Matthew 6:34

Meteorological Miscellanea

Peter Woolverton writes:

Paul McNamee, UK Editor of Big Issue, recently reported that "March was the 10th consecutive hottest month on record for global air and sea temperatures." I can only speak for Carlops after 30 years of carefully noting temperature and precipitation readings on a daily basis. Obsessive behaviour, yes, but always interesting, and I do have records going back to 1959 for south Edinburgh! Readers of a certain age may recall this column in the much missed "Carlops News and Views". I hope that it's worth another airing.

1993-94 was our first winter in Carlops. There was lying snow in our garden for a total of 100 days. This winter the total, so far, is 23, and some of those were brief and overnight. That's one example of how things are changing.

This winter, from 1st September to 23rd April I have recorded an unprecedented 42.98 inches/1092 mm of rainfall. You will have noted the waterlogged ground, the muddy pathways and the seasonal lochans between Nine Mile Burn and Penicuik demonstrating the raised water table.

On average April is the driest month of the year at 2.66 inches/68 mm. As early as the 15th of April this year we had our 2nd wettest April on record (5.40 inches/137 mm). It looks is if April 2000, with 7.39 inches/188 mm, will hold onto it's title. I told you it was interesting!

The chair that is not a chair

When is a chair not a chair? Sunday regulars at Carlops Church will find this riddle easy. Answer: When it's wheelchair pretending to be a car, or a tractor, or a shopping trolley — or anything else that the fertile imaginations of J, M, M and T (full names withheld to protect the innocent) choose to make it.

I do hope that Tom Alexander, who thoughtfully donated the wheelchair to Carlops Church some years ago, knows just how much value, pleasure and satisfaction his gift has delivered, albeit perhaps not in the manner initially envisaged. But Tom will approve.

A succession of eminently qualified and deserving potential users of the wheelchair (including the good Tom himself) have emphatically refused to sit in it, preferring to walk with the aplomb they still muster, and determined to depend upon their own strength, spirit and sheer bloody-mindedness.

And so, Tom's gift might have languished, neglected in its corner. But the joyous and inimitable Carlops custom of after-service coffee in the church has prompted those of our regulars who are currently of lesser stature (and who understandably prefer not to converse with other people's knees or abdomens) to think outside the box, and to use the wheelchair as their imaginations suggest to them. Doing so enables them to derive as much pleasure from the protracted coffee-and-chat session as their loquacious elders.

J, M, M and T (with occasional assistance from E) are these smaller-sized Carlops supporters. They already make an important contribution to our church: they put smiles on adult faces and keep them there; and they lower significantly the average age of congregation that we can report to those on high (or on somewhere). Now, they add more value, enjoy themselves thoroughly, and entertain the taller coffee-conversationalists, by exercising their considerable powers of imagination and invention. They transform the otherwise mundane and utilitarian wheelchair into various transports (sorry!) of delight, as they employ it in play as a car, a bus, a tractor, a shopping trolley, a pirate ship, a go-kart – and no doubt sundry other devices beyond this observer's interpretive powers to identify.

It's self-evidently great fun to use the wheelchair like this. And it's great fun to watch. If you're in the young people's favour, you may even be allowed to push the wheelchair for a while. Just stay out of the way when it's pretending to be a Ferrari!
